NEW CHURCH HALL GIVING US NEW VISION FOR THE FUTURE

After much deliberation it was good to present the new church hall plans after the Church Vestry meeting on the 9th April. We are grateful to our architect Dr Ed Green of the Pentan Partnership for his ideas and willingness to revise again and again as we thought the project through.

There will still be a few tweaks but the plan presented to the meeting was accepted more or less wholeheartedly. We are currently following up various comments and will take these into account as necessary.

People ask why we need a new hall.

The original hall is well past its sell by date and we need a more flexible and larger space, not only for our needs but for the community that we serve. We are producing a "village" hall which we hope will be an attractive addition to our area and will attract many new users.

We believe that this new plan will give us what we need without excessive cost and hope that planning permission will be given to us soon.

We are planning to sell a strip of land adjacent to the houses on Lake Road North . We ask you to pray with us that we get a good sum for the land which will help pay for the building.

However, we will still need your help and enthusiasm in getting us to the final sum we need. All fund raising ideas are most welcome.



Our Vicar Trystan Writes:

HOPE . . .



Dear friends,

Recently I read

one of the classic books of the Russian Orthodox Church called *The Way of a Pilgrim*.

It might not sound that fascinating, but I really got into the travels of this lowly, homeless pilgrim, as he wanders around Russia getting into all sorts of adventures. In one chapter he is mugged and robbed by two former soldiers. But all he has in his rucksack are a Bible and a book of prayers... and so that's what they take from him. He's completely distraught – it's as if he's lost the most precious treasure possible. Later on, he finally gets them back. In being reunited with his books, he hugs them to his chest and grips them so hard that his fingers practically lock in place around them. It was not the monetary value of the Bible and the prayer book that mattered to the pilgrim, but it was the fact these books were feeding his soul. And that's what The Way of the Pilgrim really challenges us to ask... what, in our lives, is feeding our minds, our hearts, our spirits, our souls?

We live in a world that tells us that "things" will feed us, will bring us the fulfilment we long for, will bring us happiness and joy. We place our "hope" in possessions, in relationships, in fame, in money, in pleasure, in popularity. But the reality that spiritual writers taught us, and increasingly what psychologists are teaching us, is that clamouring for such things leads to dissatisfaction and disappointment. We will always

feel that other people have more than us and, however much we ourselves get, we always want more. The psychologist Oliver James refers to a strange paradox of modern life which he calls "affluenza" – the more we have, the more we want, and the unhappier we become. "Affluenza" – our affluence is making us ill.

When I was at University, I went to see the film *The Matrix* in the cinema and the concept blew my mind. The movie shows people living in a false computer-generated world. Most of them don't realize they are living a lie, but the few that realize this fact decide to break out to find reality.

That's what Jesus challenges us to do in this world – break out of our false way of thinking.

"Hope" is *not* to be found in doing, or having, or wanting. Rather, it's found by letting go of things. As the fourteenth-century theologian Meister Eckhart suggested: "we don't find God by adding anything to our soul; no – we find God by taking things away".

Many of you know that 11 years ago I underwent a major operation on my back. Before the operation I went through 6 months of physical pain and emotional anxiety. What was the one thing I clinged to when I went through a time of pain and suffering? The one thing that lifted my spirits and brought me peace was a small cross that fitted in the palm of my hand. That's where my hope was centred upon — not because of what it was, as it was just a piece of wood, but of what it repre-

sented. It was not a crucifix, but an empty cross. In the empty cross, in the resurrection of Jesus, we are promised that death is not the end, that death itself is conquered. That's obviously good news for us in the future, but eternal life also has huge implications for our lives now — it helps us to put everything in perspective and it helps us to realize that material things really don't matter.

It's not that wealth, pleasure, power, relationships, popularity, are always bad things – all of them can actually be used for great good. *But* we should never put our hope in them. Instead we need to break out of attachments and stop caring for all the things that we *think* have ultimate value, all the things that we are convinced that we can't live without.

As the famous hymn puts it: "All my hope on God is founded". It's not some of my hope on God is founded, alongside my hopes about popularity, relationships, wealth, and power. No, it's all my hope on God is founded. Putting our hope in God means recognizing that the question of what we want should never replace "what does God want?", "what does God want me to do?" or "how does God want me to act?" That's what will give us true fulfillment, that's what will give us true joy. Hope is to be found in letting go of the things we think are important to us, looking at the empty cross, and then being inspired by that hope to live out lives of love, peace, and compassion.

An Update from Revd Jordan

Dear Christ Church community,

It is hard to believe that it is already May and my ordination to the priesthood is just around the corner! It has been an immense blessing to serve alongside you as your curate over the past ten months. As Bishop David noted when he presided at the confirmation service a few weeks ago, there is something special about Christ Church. You are a warm and welcoming community, and Krisi and I (and Keira!) have benefitted greatly from your hospitality. It will be an honour to serve the first chapter of my priestly ministry at Christ Church.

God willing, my ordination will be at Llandaff Cathedral on 24th June, and my first Eucharist will be at Christ Church the following morning (25th June). There will be no 8.00am service that morning – we will all gather together at 10.00am for worship and fellowship. I hope to see you there! Please keep me in your prayers as I prepare for this journey into priestly ministry.

I would also like to ask for your prayers at this time for a rather unsettling development in my current immigration status. As you know, Krisi and I have been living in the UK since I began my PhD studies in Scotland in 2011. Our current visas expire at the end of June, and we recently learned that we will not be able to extend those visas going forward.

What does this all mean?

In order to apply for a new visa, my employer (St Padarn's Institute) will need to re-advertise my post to meet the UK market test.

I will then need to reapply for the position and, if I am once more offered the post, promptly return to the States to apply for a new visa. Sadly, this means jumping back across the pond the day after my first Eucharist.

As you can imagine, this has been a rather worrying time for the Hilleberts! Nevertheless, we are trusting in God's good plan for our lives and his continued provision.

'For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you' (Jer. 29:11-12).

If all goes well... we should be back in Wales (and at Christ Church!) by the end of July.


One of the most senior and experienced church leaders in the UK will be the next Bishop of Llandaff.

June Osborne, who has served as Dean of Salisbury for the past 13 years, has been chosen as the 72nd Bishop of Llandaff, a diocese which serves most of Cardiff, the South Wales Valleys and the Vale of Glamorgan.

A ground-breaking figure in the Church of England, Dean June was the first female Dean to be appointed to a medieval cathedral, having served as Salisbury Cathe-

dral's Canon Treasurer for nearly 10 years.

The appointment will be confirmed on July 14th at a meeting of the Sacred Synod of Church in Wales Bishops in Brecon Cathedral where Dean June will be consecrated as Bishop the following day (July 15th). She will be enthroned at Llandaff Cathedral on July 22nd.



FUNDRASING IDEAS for New Church Hall

Linda's article in this month's CREDO outlines the position we have arrived at regarding the New Hall, also mentioning the fundraising necessary for the build.

Even after the sale of the Plot we will still need to raise between £50/100,000 to complete it.

We need to start fundraising in earnest. Outright gifts are, of course, most welcome but other fundraising ideas, which can involve all of us, will be necessary.

I have some ideas but welcome others. I will post a list on the Notice Board and ask you to sign up for what you are willing to be responsible for.

Years ago when we were raising money to clear the mortgage on the original Vicarage 4 or 5 youngsters - they were 13/14 years old - ran the Cardiff half Marathon, an idea maybe?

The present Hall was built in 1972 at a cost of £7,000 with money raised by the Congregation. As a comparison a new house at Lakeside cost around £3/4000!



"FIVE BOYS + A PASTY"

A nostalgic and entertaining evening was given by John Sheen talking about his boyhood days in Port Talbot.

John was born in 1947-during those austere early post-was years. He was trained in amateur dramatics, and became a member of Cwmbran Operatic Society. Following teacher training he was a primary school teacher, and later a head teacher.

The love of theatre played a big part in his life, and when asked he became a part-time manager of the Dolman Theatre in Newport; a post he fulfilled for two & a half years. Then cupid took a hand and John met his future wife but continued to be involved as Actor and Director. His activities now broadened out to talks to various Groups, and a developing interest in the production of visual aids and family history research.

John's family also featured. His father joined Port Talbot Operatic Society in 1953 and his brother is still a member. His daughter has featured in a number of well-known West End musicals and his nephew is the Hollywood actor Michael Sheen.

John pointed out that his background was the average family of the time.

No telephone, car, credit card, computer, - or drugs. However, he did admit to the odd illicit sniff of Dab-it- Off cleaner that was the favoured stain remover of the era. John described this time as one of radiant unsophistication. Memories of Friday's tin bath and syrup of figs ritual produced much hilarity. The outdoor toilet involved John carefully cutting newspaper squares to hang for the family's "convenience "

His church singing at weddings earned him the princely sum of half a crown. There was little entertainment, although John recalls the radio show with Archie Andrews, which was very popular and attracted a listening audience of over 13 million.

The careful use of coal fires required warm clothing, and John revealed that unusually he had been given a liberty bodice to wear as protection against the cold!! His grandmother's preferred protection was a daily dose of egg nog (raw egg and sherry). John handed out to us a sample of a popular drink of the time, Corona's Dandelion and Burdock.



The peculiar use of the front room was also mentioned. It's use was forbidden, apart from high days, weddings, or funerals. Gentian violet was always available for healing wounds, and rather strangely for other disorders he was given Friar's Balsam poured over a lump of sugar. Sweets would continue to be rationed for a considerable time to come. A favourite of the day was Fry's Five Boys chocolate. (well remembered by the audience.) As was the favourite foot wear, Daps - Dunlop all purpose shoes. John also evoked fond memories of inexpensive Ladybird books and the use of Beacon Books, now out of favour with the teaching profession.

The evening was lively with much audience participation. Gill provided a lovely buffet and the evening concluded with Howard offering a prayer to the Lord for our continued safekeeping.

Ken Perkins: 50 years in the Choir at Christ Church: Roath Park

2nd May: Athanasius the theologian who gave us the Nicene Creed

This is the name behind the Athanasian Creed.

Athanasius (296-373) was born into a prosperous family in Alexandria in Egypt, studied in the Christian school there and entered the ministry. He was twenty-nine years old when he accompanied Alexander, the Bishop of Alexandria, to the Church's first ecumenical Council, at Nicaea in 325.


Although Athanasius could not take part in the Council's debates because he was a deacon and not a bishop, Alexander consulted him on the meaning of biblical texts and theological distinctions. With Emperor Constantine sitting as President, three hundred bishops argued about the Person of Christ.

How is He the Son of God? Is He God or man or both together? Did He exist before He was born? If we worship Him does that mean we are worshipping two Gods? The young Athanasius saw that some bishops wanted to impose the teaching of Arius on the Church. Arius was a popular preacher in Alexandria who taught that Christ was not eternal but was a 'Saviour' created by the Father.

Athanasius worked with his bishop, Alexander, in framing what became known as the Nicene Creed.

Our Lord's full divinity was safeguarded in the words, 'eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one substance with the Father.'

When Bishop Alexander died in 328, Athanasius succeeded him as Bishop by popular demand. For the next 45 years Athanasius' devotion, scholarship, and forceful leadership established the Nicene Creed in the Christian Church. His enemies, both in Church and state, conspired



against him, and he was exiled five times from the See of Alexandria and spent a total of 17 years in flight and hiding. It was his uncompromising stand for Nicene theology that gave rise to the familiar saying, Athanasius contra mundum, 'Athanasius against the world.'

Athanasius' name will always be linked with the triumph of New Testament Christology over every form of reductionism. Of his many writings the most significant was his great study on the person and work of Christ; 'On the Incarnation of the Word of God', written before he was 30 years old. The whole Church of Christ is always in need of bishops, leaders and theologians in the mould of Athanasius.

Thy Kingdom Come

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are calling Christians of every denomination to join in with **Thy Kingdom Come**, a prayer initiative between Ascension and Pentecost (25th May to 4th June), to pray for the nation to know Jesus Christ. It is a time to seek the empowering of the Holy Spirit, that we may be effective witnesses to Jesus Christ.

Praying for others to know Jesus is one of the most powerful things we can do. Persistent prayer for others brings transformation to their lives. As Paul writes: 'Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should.' (Colossians 4: 2-4).

As Paul says, consistent praying for others involves discipline ('be devoted') and responding to what God is already doing in people's lives ('being watchful and thankful'). We can pray for 'open doors' to point people to Jesus and what He can mean in their lives. We all have opportunities to do this, as even Paul prayed as a prisoner in chains!!

The Archbishops are encouraging us to choose five people who we can pray for regularly. Why not ask God to guide you, as you settle on five names and commit to praying for them daily, perhaps by using the following prayer:



Is your garden falling silent?

Where is all the wildlife?

When did you last see a fox, mouse, frog, squirrel, bumblebee or even butterfly?

If you have to stop and think, you will understand the problem: 51 per cent, or more than half, of Britain's gardeners did not spot a single hedgehog, owl, frog, fox, mouse or bat in their gardens over the past year. That compares with 48 per cent in 2015.

As for birds, 29 per cent of people did not see any of the birds on the RSPB's red list, which lists those in need of protection, such as starlings and sparrows. And sightings of ladybirds are down five per cent in just the last year.

Why the C of E is keeping its customs of reading the marriage banns

The C of E has recently voted to keep its medieval tradition of reading the marriage banns. Not because it is worried about 'illegal' marriages taking place, but because it hopes it will help to keep up congregation numbers among young people. Members of the General Synod, who met and voted on it in February, said that ditching the popular tradition would mean losing an important source of new worshippers.

Just under 45,000 people got married in CofE churches in 2015. So, as one archdeacon explained, reading the banns 'gives us access to 90,000 people in the 18-45 age group, which is the age group that we struggle to reach.' *Parish Pump*

New Director for the Anglican Centre, Rome

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and the Governors of the Anglican Centre in Rome have recently announced the appointment of Archbishop Bernard Ntahoturi, Primate of the Anglican Church of Burundi from 2005 until 2016, as the Representative of the Archbishop of Canterbury to the Holy See and Director of the Anglican Centre in Rome. He succeeds Archbishop David Moxon who retires in June.

Born in 1948, Archbishop Ntahoturi grew up in a small village in Matana, Southern Burundi, the son of a poor farming family. After training at Bishop Tucker Theological College in Mukono, Uganda, he was ordained in 1973. He came to England to further his theological training at Ridley Hall and St John's in Cambridge, and then at Lincoln College, Oxford.

After his studies, he returned to Burundi where he joined the civil service, becoming chief of staff to President Jean-Baptiste Bagaza. After the overthrowing of President Bagaza in 1987, in a military coup, he was jailed from 1987 to 1990. In 1992, he became Provincial Secretary of the Anglican Church of Burundi until 1997. In 1997, Bernard Ntahoturi was consecrated Bishop of Matana Diocese and became Archbishop Primate of the Province of the Anglican Church of Burundi in 2005.

Archbishop Ntahoturi served as chair of the Council of Anglican provinces in Africa from 2011-2016, and as a member of the Anglican Consultative Council Standing Committee from ACC 9-ACC 11 (1993-2012).

Archbishop Ntahoturi has been active in seeking peace in war-torn Burundi and the great Lakes region of Africa, and has represented the protestant churches of Burundi during the peace and reconciliation negotiations in Tanzania, which were instrumental in bringing peace to Burundi.

Dunstan (909 - 988) was the most popular saint in England for nearly two centuries, being famous for many stories about defeating the devil.

A story tells how as a monk Dunstan nailed a horseshoe to the Devil's hoof when he was asked to re-shoe the Devil's horse. This caused such pain, and Dunstan only agreed to remove the shoe and release the Devil after he promised never to enter a place where a horseshoe is over the door.

St Dunstan is the patron saint of blacksmiths and bell ringers as well as goldsmiths and silversmiths. His Feast Day is 19 May, which is why the date year on the hallmarks on gold and silver runs from 19 to 18 May, not the calendar year.



GOD IN THE ARTS - When David met Goliath

The meeting of David and Goliath is one of the most colourful and dynamic of the Old Testament stories. I like the joke about the teacher asking the children, 'What does the story of Goliath teach us?' and a little boy replies, 'To duck.'

But Goliath thinks he is invincible and has no need to duck. Why should he fear just a shepherd boy? J. John imagines David looking at Goliath, and thinking 'He is so big and I am so small.' Then looking again, and thinking, 'He is so big: how can I miss?' And so victory goes not to the strong, the proud, the self-confident, but to those who simply trust in the name of the Lord and their own wits. Right asserts itself over might as David conquers and Goliath falls to the ground.

That dramatic moment is caught vividly in this life-sized statue by Bernini sculpted for the garden of Cardinal Borghese in Rome in 1624. **1 Samuel 16** tells how Samuel anoints David, the youngest of Jesse's sons, who then goes to meet Goliath with only his shepherd's sling. We can see the pursed lips and the look of serious concentration on

David's face. We sense the intensity of that moment and the latent energy as he prepares

to throw the stone. We don't see Goliath, but he is there in our imagination, for we know that David will be victorious against the heavily armed Philistine.

Perhaps we can read there a message for the Church when it is tempted to rely on the protection of buildings, power structures and dogmatic authority and forget to trust in God's guidance. Perhaps the message is to each of us as we journey and find ourselves battling against the forces of injustice and darkness that seem so powerful. Then, when we feel weak, we have to learn to trust in God and have faith that He will be with us.
