### Our Vicar Trystan Writes:

### Ordination . . .

Dear friends,

Huge congratulations to Revd Jordan, our curate, who was ordained priest at the end of last month at Llandaff Cathedral. We had a wonderful service at the Cathedral, with a good number of Christ Church folk in attendance, and then a joyful first Eucharist as priest for Revd Jordan at Christ Church.

I was honoured to preach at the service in Llandaff Cathedral.

I began by reminding Jordan and those being ordained with him that, at the heart of ordained ministry, is to notice, to announce, and to bring Christ's love, hope, peace, and compassion to individuals and communities.

The Catholic philosopher Theilard De Chardin described the priest as a "border walker", traversing the border between our world and God's kingdom, and bringing those on earth closer to God's love. What an amazing privilege that call is – Jordan has been ordained to open the eyes of our congregation to Christ's presence, to open our ears to His call, to open our hearts to His love, and to open our ways to His will.

Thomas Aquinas studied theology for many years at the University of Paris, and, we are told, in his very final lecture he raised his hand and asked his tutor "yes, but what is God?" Quid est Deus? What is God?

The call of the priest, then, is to show people what God is, who God is, who Christ is. They do this by opening eyes to God's beauty all around. But they also do this by reaching out to the poor and disadvantaged in parishes, by offering compassion to the elderly, the lonely, and the grieving, and by offering hope to the addicted, the weak, or lost. The theologian Paul Tillich wrote that our words and lives should be as if we are "holding up a picture of Christ" to others. As St Paul said, "it is not you who lives, but Christ who lives in you".

But the risen Christ, of course, was often not recognised – at the tomb, on the road to Emmaus, on the shoreline. Priests aim to introduce people to the unrecognised Christ all around – yes, in the beauty of nature, in the silence of worship, in the smiles of their families and friends, and in the uplifting melodies of music, but also in the eyes of the oppressed and marginalized and in the compassionate response to those crying out in need.

The early explorers of the South Sea Islands are said to have shown a window to the natives on one island, and, to their surprise, the inhabitants were not able to see through the glass. Instead, they focused on the glass itself and failed to see beyond it. The priest's role is to help us all see beyond – to experience the wonder of the creation story on a countryside walk, to see the burning bush in any ordinary tree that we walk past, to recognise the cross and resurrection in times of grief, loss, or suffering, to meet Christ in our friends and in strangers, to witness God's kingdom breaking through all around, and to taste bread of heaven in every meal we share.

Ministry is unbelievably rewarding, but it can also be demanding and challenging, so please do keep Jordan, and the rest of us who are ministering to you here in Christ Church, in your prayers. Feel free to use the following prayer in your quiet time:



"Loving God, we thank you for inspiring women and men of faith to various ministries in the church. Continue to fill them with your Spirit of wisdom and grace to proclaim the Good News and to take your love into communities with joyful and hopeful hearts. Through Jesus Christ, our Lord, Amen"

Finally, why not think about your own calling. The theologian Henri de Lubac wrote that there are two key moments in the communion service.

**First,** and most obvious, is the consecration of the bread and wine.

But the **second** key moment in the Eucharist, according to de Lubac, is in the final words of the service:

"Go in peace to love and serve the Lord".

Have a think about *how* you go in peace to love and serve the Lord. It may be that you find that God is pulling you in a surprising direction. It may be that you'll feel a little tug towards the priesthood yourself. If so, be brave and talk to Revd Jordan or myself about this. Or you might want to talk to us instead about a call to lay ministry – to lead services as a Reader, to be part of a pastoral care team, to assist at a Funky Church, to help during Sunday services. Most importantly, though, whether God is calling you to any of these things or if you are already following your vocation in some other way (in the church, in work, in your family, or in your everyday life), we must all keep in mind the advice of St Teresa of Calcutta: "It's not how much you do that matters, but how much love you put into the things that you do".



### Mercy

If one was asked "What is your understanding of the word Mercy?" I suppose most people would turn to the Magistrates Courts where a Magistrate might – for a 1<sup>st</sup> offence – let off the culprit. But what of 2<sup>nd</sup> thoughts?

It must be said, time and again, that Jews tested the patience of God and it was not surprising that he often came down hard on them. The Old Testament is full of instances of such force. However, in the life and teachings of Jesus as found in the New Testament Gospels the emphasis is on generous love. "Slow to chide and swift to bless", as the writer of a letter to the church at Philippi put it; "Christ Jesus who being in very nature God did not consider equality with God to be used to his advantage." Philippians 2:5,6.

The 3 years of his ministry were a time of pity, compassion and love as witnessed by the many who were given back sight or cured of terrible diseases, which often separated their lives from the norm leaving them little better than beggars.

In our reading of the Gospels we find that out of mercy comes forgiveness. This is beautifully pictured in the parable, Jesus used, of the Prodigal Son. Here love, mercy and forgiveness are bound together. Luke 15: 1-32.

There is also the part justice played which the Jewish leaders frequently found out to their cost. Near the end Jesus looked down on Jerusalem. "Jerusalem, Jerusalem how many times have I wanted to put my arms around all your people, just as a hen gathers her chicks, but you would not let me".

Some years ago my wife and I came across what we felt as a perfect understanding of God's mercy as undeserved love. It seemed to get to the very heart of God's and could not be bettered. Luke 13:34. Matthew 23:37.

## 84<sup>th</sup> Scouting for Bernard started when his son Timothy joined cubs with Gwenda Palmer in 1967.

By 1968 he had become treasurer joining the 84<sup>th</sup> committee of Alan and Barbra Jeffreys, Henry and Audrey Brown and Bernard Davies. Those early meetings were held in Rhydypenau School and at one stage a momentous decision must have been made for us to have our own hut on a piece of somewhat boggy allotment ground that Cardiff Council made available for us in 1971.

By the time I became involved in 1973 it had be come apparent that it was a very expensive option to own our own premises, most of the other church sponsored groups meeting in church halls, but with Bernard we were exceptionally lucky, as he could solve any problem and there were many, from plumbing to electrical problems, keys stuck in locks, broken windows and lights – endless jobs involving his carpentry skills.

### Bernard had an answer to everything.

The Scout Hut is full of his handiwork – one of the most ingenious being the unique folding tables we take to camp, all beautifully crafted and finished. He saved us so much money, but there were still many bills to pay and many of you will remember Bernard's recycling skills. In the early days it was the collection of waste paper - tons of it, but it paid well - much of the proceeds helped to build the Church Hall. Eventually the market changed and it was no longer cost effective, so we moved to recycling aluminium. We all remember Bernard collecting cans wherever he went on his long walks - for Sunday walks to his daughter Heather in Thornhill for lunch and to Albany Road, the 'rec' was fruitful hunting ground

as were the local woods and back of Lakeside shops.

It was however, form 1975 that are my most vivid memories of Bernard – the earliest being Cub camp at Miskin. My only experience of camping up to that point was a fateful overnight camp in a local vicarage garden when lightning tore our tent apart, but I figured it couldn't be too difficult – could it? Bernard offered to cook for me so we set off –

The reality was, as Bernard must have known, very different. There were many many 'rules' and I am sure he smoothed the way for me so that by the end of that camp we had started both a friendship and partnership that was to last for over 40 years. Bernard and I enjoyed many Cub camps – we both believed in good discipline and respect so all the Cubs sat down to eat quietly and when the last had finished they all did washing up and campsite tidy up - we have many trophies as proof. As many leaders know, to have a camp cook is fantastic, a welcome mug of tea after struggling with often wet heavy canvas, or an early morning cup of coffee. Bernard did all this and more at Miskin and continued repair work there long after his retirement, until early this year.

However it was all the work we did together which helped make the 84<sup>th</sup> into the successful group we have today. Many people will remember seeing Bernard and I apparently in deep discussions and often we were, as in any organisation there are always problems and although he was our treasurer until 2009 that was only part of his expertise which helped us to grow and prosper.

All Scout groups are part of the wider scouting community, which often seems to involve endless committee meetings and Bernard had often to bribe me with free transport to them, though we did often sit at the back, so we could make a speedy exit if we felt proceedings were dragging on.

Some of our outings were fun fetes and festivals in different parts of Wales, meeting Chief Scouts, presenting and receiving awards. One of the most memorable was when we presented Bernard with a gift at one of our barbecues as thanks for his long and dedicated service to the 84<sup>th</sup>. Our BBQ's started in 1995 on Cardiff High School back field, and very handily Bernard had a back gate on to the field so he was very hands on right from the start, moving equipment to and from the hut as well as solving many problems.

Everything Bernard did was done to the best of his ability so our accounts were meticulously done. We checked and double checked everything, often meeting half way between our houses to make sure of our facts and many other things besides - often though he would call by and very luckily for me he didn't come empty handed, arriving with offers of fresh fruit and vegetables - his cooking apples kept me going all winter. Worshiping with us all at Christ Church was so important for Bernard and it was his strong faith that we all will remember, not just us in Scouting but many others including his neighbours. He would often be seen cutting their grass or up a ladder. He used the skills he was given to such advantage that we all benefited, and all done so joyfully.

I valued Bernard's friendship enormously; it was a real privilege to have known him.

Jane Austin - 200 years since her death. Jane Austen, a brilliant, quintessentially English novelist much loved for her irony, social realism and criticism of the upper classes, died 200 years ago this month, on 18th July 1817. She was almost unknown in her lifetime, having published books like Pride and Prejudice, Sense and Sensibility and Mansfield Park anonymously.

She was also a Christian (and the daughter of a rector) but did not wear her heart on her sleeve. A reticent Anglican, she wrote early on that she "did not like the Evangelicals" but later felt that those who were Evangelicals "from reason and feeling must be happiest and safest". Her novel Mansfield Park tackles a theme dear to the heart of many late eighteenth century Evangelicals – the abolition of the slave trade. Throughout her writing her main characters are transformed by love, an idea of course central to Christianity. Her faith may not call attention to itself in her novels, but it is everywhere in her work.

One critic wrote: "The stories are subversive and work like Jesus' parables. The humour and the ironic insight into human sin get under your skin." An image of Jane Austen will appear on the new polymer £10 note, to be released in September.

### The role of Faith in politics

### Faith has a central role to play in politics, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have said.

In a recent pastoral letter to the parishes and chaplaincies of the Church of England, Archbishops Justin Welby and John Sentamu urged people to remember Britain's Christian history and heritage. They called for reconciliation, for a drawing on shared British values based on cohecourage and stability. sion,

This is a time of "deep and profound questions of identity," they said.

"Opportunities to renew and reimagine our shared values as a country and a United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland only come around every few generations. We are in such a time. Our Christian heritage, our current choices and our obligations to future generations and to God's world will all play a shaping role."

The Archbishops highlighted major concerns over poverty, housing and the dangers of "crushing" debt, among other issues. They called for a hospitable welcome to refugees and migrants, but also warned against being "deaf to the legitimate concerns" about the scale of migration into some communities.

They also single out the importance of standing up for those suffering persecution on grounds of faith around the world. Faith, they argue, has a unique role to play in preventing extremism and religiously motivated violence.

"Contemporary politics needs to reevaluate the importance of religious belief," they insist. "The new Parliament, if it is to take religious freedom seriously, must treat as an essential task the improvement of religious literacy."

They add: "Political responses to the problems of religiously-motivated violence and extremism, at home and overseas, must also recognise that solutions will not be found simply in further secularisation of the public realm. Parish Pump



### 11th July St. Benedict author of the famous Rule

St. Benedict (c.480 - c.550) was an abbot and author of the famous Rule that bears his name. Because of his Rule, Benedict is also the Patriarch of Western Monasticism, and Patron Saint of Europe.

Surprisingly little is known about his life. Born at Nursia, Benedict studied at Rome, which he then left before completing his studies to become a hermit at Subiaco. After a time disciples joined him, whom he organised into twelve deaneries of ten. After an attempt on his life, Benedict moved on to



Monte Cassino, near Naples, where he wrote the final version of his Rule.

Benedict's Rule is justly famous and respected: not only did it incorporate much traditional monastic teaching from revered monks like Basil, but Benedict went on to modify this in a way characterised by prudence and moderation within a framework of authority, obedience, stability and community life.

Benedict's great achievement was to produce a monastic way of life that was complete, orderly, and workable. The monks' primary occupation was liturgical prayer, complemented by sacred reading and manual work of various kinds

Benedict's own personality shines through this Rule: wise, discreet, flexible, learned in the law of God, but also a spiritual father to his community. Benedict's Rule came to be recognised as the fundamental monastic code of Western Europe in the early Middle Ages. Because of his Rule, monasteries became centres of learning, agriculture, hospitality, and medicine.

Thus Benedict came to influence the lives of millions of people.

### Iraq's church leaders call for help to protect ancient Christian communities

Iraq's three main church traditions have issued a joint statement calling for international action to safeguard the "rights of Christian communities in the historic Nineveh Plains", including the establishment of a "safe haven" for Christians in the region.


The joint statement by church leaders followed a proclamation by a prominent Iraqi Shia cleric that "Jihad should be implemented in regard to the Christians in order for them to convert to Islam. Either they will become Muslims or we must fight them, or they ought to pay jizya." Jizya is a tax paid to an Islamic government by non-Muslims as a sign of subjugation, according to classical Islam.

The threat of anti-Christian violence continuing, despite the progress made in defeating Islamic State, remains a real concern for Iraqi believers, reports the Barnabas Fund. An Iraqi MP has recently stated that around 1.5 million Iraqi Christians have fled the country since 2003.

## St. IGNATIUS of LOYOLA: 31st July

The youngest of 13 children, Ignatius Loyola was born in Spain. When a young soldier he was badly wounded by a cannon ball that shattered his leg. As he recovered he asked for a best selling book of the day, a romance, to read to take his mind off the pain but ended up reading about Jesus and the lives of the saints. His life changed as he resolved to continue being a soldier, but now as a soldier for Christ.

In 1534, at the age of 43, he and 6 others offered themselves to the service of the Catholic Church. They became the Society of Jesus and Ignatius was elected to serve as their first general. When other Jesuits were sent on various missions by the pope, Ignatius stayed in Rome founding homes for orphans and colleges all, in the words of the Jesuit motto, 'ad majorem Dei

gloriam' - for the greater glory of a God.



## GOD IN THE ARTS the Queen of Sheba

In this series we are exploring the wealth of stories and colourful characters in scripture – Noah and Samson, David and Daniel, for example, whose adventures show God working in their lives. There are other, more intriguing characters who appear for a short time only and then are gone: Melchizedek, the wise men, and this month, the Queen of Sheba.



With Handel's wonderful music ringing in our ears, we read of the arrival of the Queen at Solomon's court in 1 Kings 10. She comes to find out about his wisdom and to exchange gifts. After 13 verses she returns home, and the story ends.

But this exotic character lived on in the imagination of the Jewish people, and Jesus mentions her in the Gospels. He tells the scribes and Pharisees wanting a sign, that even though the Queen was aware of Solomon's riches and grandeur, there is something greater than Solomon in front of their eyes. In the Middle Ages the *Golden Legend* wove other stories around that visit. Its purpose was to see a branch of the tree of life in Eden that Solomon had made into a bridge. She tells him of her vision that one day that very wood would be used for the cross of the Saviour.

In the 15<sup>th</sup> century Piero della Francesca painted frescoes on this saga for the church of St Francis in Arezzo. He imbues the scene where the Queen meets Solomon with a stately, statuesque beauty: silence reigns as she bends her head, aware of the true importance of this wood. Somehow the Old Testament prefigures the New for that tree in Eden has stretched out its branches across their world as it will across other ages to root itself on Calvary. For all the legend, we capture something in this painting of the mysterious movement of salvation working in the characters of the Old Testament and pointing us to its fulfilment in the New, where we find that a greater than Solomon is truly there.
