We are sad to announce the death of George Cable. He happily was able to celebrate his 100th Birthday with us, back in February. We remember his family in our prayers at this sad time. Val Jones has written a tribute to him inside. Some of this was printed in our March Edition but we felt it was well worth repeating.

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Our dear friend, George Cable by Val Jones

George was from Lowestoft. He was born on February 16th 1920, just fifteen months after the end of the first World War; he was the fourth of seven children.

He loved his life in Lowestoft surrounded by family and friends. George came to live in Cardiff with his daughter Jo about 9 years ago following the death of his wife, Sheila.

He loved coming to services at Christ Church and so enjoyed Tuesday afternoons with the Good Companions, and monthly Monday mornings with the daytime Connexions group. At Good Companions he loved chatting to people, singing, playing cards and dominos and was particularly pleased when we had cake! George was an avid reader and loved listening to classical music. In his sitting room in Lake Road West,



he was surrounded by his books, records, and mementos.

I would often visit George in his home and he would reminisce about his life in Lowestoft: helping his father raise pigs; delivering bread for the local bakery; working in the fish market and an artificial silk factory. In his teenage years he was a member of the local Boys' Brigade gymnastics display team and told

me how he was honoured to be selected to take part in an exhibition display at the Albert Hall in London – quite an achievement for a Lowestoft lad! And he had fond memories of exploring 1930s London during that visit.

During the war George served with the Loyal Suffolk Hussars. He told me his story of June 1944:

The 220th Anti-Tank Battery Loyal Suffolk Hussars: waiting until it was our turn to join the convoy on the A12 in the early hours of the morning and trusting that all the hours of training were worth the effort. Arriving in the London area we were told to bed down in tents and that there was a delay of 24 hours for some reason. The next day off to the docks and boarded a USA Liberty Ship and then sailed down the Thames. The cranes on the bankside bowed down to us as we passed, so this must be the real thing.

That night down below was rather stuffy and I told my mate it would be better to sleep on the bow, so off we went to settle down for the night. A prolonged noise woke me up and I saw a lot of sparks, but I just went back to sleep. Unbeknown to me (I was told later) a German shell had dropped down the funnel and buried itself in the coal; the Navy had come alongside and shouted out why we were losing speed and leaving the convoy. The reply was that we had a bomb aboard and were trying to dig it out. The sailors replied that as the bomb had not exploded already the ship was safe, and they left.

In the morning we were told the news and later saw the crew lift out the 5-foot shell and drop it overboard. The steam engine was in a bad way, so we were very late in arriving in France. Then it was down with the nets and climbing down into the landing craft.

He witnessed some harrowing sights in Belgium and the Netherlands which continued to haunt him. He stayed on for a year after the war as part of the army of occupation and met Field Marshall Montgomery who chastised him for not being in full uniform even though he was doing some manual labour on the side of the road!

George often told me that after the war he didn't think he would get married as all the American soldiers based in East Anglia had taken the local girls back to the USA as GI brides. However, in early 1952 he met his future wife Sheila and they married in March 1953. They had three children, Alex, Roderick, and Jo. During their retirement years Sheila and George were actively involved in a Suffolk Arts

" Link / Suffolk County Council library project entitled 'Full of life': they both had poems published. The couple were also involved in a project with school children to encourage creative writing.

Just over a year ago, in November 2019, he proudly wore his war medals to our church Service

of Remembrance. A couple of months later, in early February 2020 and just before his 100th birthday, he travelled back to Lowestoft where he was honoured with a 'This Is Your Life' ceremony by the St John Ambulance. George had been a senior first aider and trainer rising to the rank of Divisional Superintendent. One of his first major achievements was to launch an appeal in 1973 for the purchase of a brand new ambulance costing £4,000 - today this is the equivalent of £42,000.

On Sunday February 16th we in Christ Church, celebrated his actual 100th birthday with George and his daughter, with singing led by the Funky Church children followed by a reception in the hall, and a couple of days later the Good Companions held a party for this very special centenarian.

George brought so much joy to everyone he met: it has been a privilege to know this gentle, modest man. $\lor al$
